


Jasmin from Seal class was on Newsround yesterday. She sent a video to them for 'Thank a Teacher Day'. Here is the video link:

Elsie's drawing of Henry VIII is very lifelike. Stunning Elsie. Such talent! (Kon Tiki Class)




Ben in year 4 has typed his own story on the computer. Well done Ben.

### In school Learning


This week Nina, Sarah, Matt and Leah have been the teachers on duty, supported by Nacera, Elaine, Michelle, Donna and Kay.
