Dear Parents & Carers,

It was fantastic seeing some of our year 6 pupils walk through the playground gates on Monday. They were clearly very excited to be back in school and received a very warm welcome from their teachers.

As I am sure you are aware the government has accepted that it is not practically possible for all children to return to school before the end of term. This is due to the space required to enable social distancing, availability of staff, and also parents' willingness to send children into school. As a school we are constantly reviewing our arrangements. Due to parental preferences we have made the decision not to reopen our nursery.

As we have had lower numbers of children return to school in the eligible year groups (year 1, year 6 and Reception) than expected, we are reviewing our capacity. We are currently collecting information from parents of children in year 5 and hope to provide some provision for children in this year group before the end of term.

Critical Workers

If parents are critical workers, they may request a place within a critical worker bubble. These are mixed year group bubbles. We have a limited number of spaces and parents requesting this need

to show proof of their critical worker status.

FSM Edenred vouchers

Parents will continue to receive Edenred vouchers for the days that their children are not in school.

New Build Update

Due to the lockdown construction work on our new school building was unable to start as planned. We are however, very pleased to announce that the council are due to sign the contract with the building company next week and building works will commence on the 3rd August. The enabling works to playground entrances will all take place at this point.

World Ocean Day

And make a big, enormous stash.




This description could be published. It is outstanding. Well done Elliot. I hope you finish the story.





Daniella in Octopus class has been clearly working extremely hard. She emailed lots of examples of her work.


She has completed amazing work on multiples, and it looks like she had a lot of fun exploring musical instruments and then designing and making her own. Keep it up Daniella!
