Reduce Air Pollution – Avoid Idling!

Dear Parents and Carers,

It has been a very eventful week. As you are aware we have an outbreak of COVID in school (see update below), but despite this we have managed to remain fully open with lots of fantastic events occuring around the school.

Idling Action Workshop: On Thursday year 5 children took part in a workshop about air pollution. In this workshop, they looked at how congestion on our streets leads to idling. Idling is one of the largest producers of air pollution in suburban areas. It is a particularly concerning issue around schools and residential communities. Idling reduces your vehicle's fuel economy, costs you money, and creates pollution. Idling for more than 10 seconds uses more fuel and produces more emissions that contribute to smog and climate change than stopping and restarting your engine does.

The children created some fantastic posters, which will be used to create a banner to help increase awareness of the impact of idling. They have not finished them yet but you can see more of the posters here.



10 of the children from year 5 volunteered to be 'Idling Action ambassadors' and spoke to some motorists about considering switching their engine off when sitting in traffic or while waiting for children to come out of school. We would like to say a huge thank you to those parents who turned their engines off! The children were very sensible and polite.

Lawyer visits year 6: On Monday, Mr David Irvin, a Commercial lawyer, spoke with Year 6 about different areas of law including Family Law, Criminal Law, Property Law and Environmental Law. He also spoke about the function of the Bank and what role the law plays in the world of Commerce (locally and internationally). The children thoroughly enjoyed hearing about his journey!

### Amber Alert - COVID Outbreak

As you are aware we have an outbreak of COVID in school. I am sure that you have noticed that many members of staff have been absent this week. We have also had high notification of children testing positive too. As a result I contacted Public Health England and informed them that we had an 'outbreak'. We are now on an 'Amber alert'. This means that we have increased measures to try to reduce transmission.

All staff have been asked to complete daily lateral flow tests and we have also requested that children in Reception, year 2, 3&4 and 6 complete daily lateral flow test if possible. This is a preventative measure to catch COVID early and reduce transmission. If a child has symptoms however, then they should do a PCR test as per the letter that was sent out on the 18th January.

Lateral Flow tests: Unfortunately, the school is not able to access lateral flow tests on behalf of children (I have asked Public Health Southwark). They have provided the followind links and suggested that parents order kits using these links:

#### **Enhanced Social Distancing Measures**

We have been asked to increase our social distancing measures in school whenever it is practical to do so. Currently the following adjustments have been made:

- All assemblies will occur in the classroom virtually or led by the class teacher.
- Workshops will be delivered with one class at a time.
- School trips will not occur until after half term.

- Staff meetings will all be held virtually.
- > Staff to avoid mixing across year groups whenever possible.
- All visitors to the school will complete lateral flow tests before coming to school.
- Adults to wear masks in communal areas and during meetings. (Staff will not wear masks when working with children).
- Parents and visitors to the school will still be required to wear a mask (despite national lifting of restrictions).

### Cleaning and hygiene

- Children have been reminded to have good hygiene standards.
- Children and adults are washing or sanitizing their hands regularly throughout the day.
- Enhanced cleaning of touch points continues.
- Reduction in children sharing equipment. Equipment sanitized or quarantined prior to passing to another class.

I will continue to monitor the number of cases and will keep you informed of any further actions if they are required. I will be updating Public Health to review and consider the COVID cases within the school on a two weekly basis minimum.

If you have not booked your COVID vaccination please do so as COVID numbers are still high in Southwark.

Lifting of restrictions does not apply to schools when there is an outbreak.

**Yoga:** Thames class had their second yoga session and are now proficient at holding poses that strengthen and stretch their spines.










