

Evidence shows that the more a child reads for pleasure, the greater their academic attainment, so don't forget to join Canada Water Library. It is a great way to get children interested in books.


Consultation for joining the Nexus Trust


DT at Rotherhithe

After investigating how wheels move on a variety of different objects, the children were then asked to create a simple version of a wheel mechanism, including an axle, wheel and axle holder. 






World Book Day 2022






Sponsorship Forms




Dr Xargle's Book of Earthlets


Author: Jeanne Willis Illustrator: Tony Ross



This is a very funny book describing human behaviour from the perspective of Dr Xargle, who is writing a travel guide about humans for his fellow aliens. It is a must read for all ages!
