**Internet Safety Day:** On Tuesday 7th February, RPS and other schools across the UK took part in Safer Internet Day. This year's Safer Internet Day was the 20th edition of the campaign. The children have completed a range of activities online to teach them about how to keep safe.

On Wednesday the 8<sup>th</sup>, Key Stage 2 children

took part in an online workshop covering "being safe on the internet". This covered how to recognize when someone is being mean and how to deal with this if it happens. The workshop also covered a wide variety of important safety tips to consider when browsing the internet, using a social media app or other activities online.



The children later took part in a Microsoft developed Role Playing game called "Internet Legends Interland". The game posed some challenging puzzles that the children had to solve in order to move forward within several virtual worlds available to them on this exciting platform.

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In Year 1, the students have been learning about Spanish artist Joan Miro and making art inspired by his own art style. They have also been busy linking sculpture work with their study of Hinduism.

The students in Year 6 learnt about the life of Mexican artist Frida Kahlo. We looked at her self portraits. She used a lot of bright colours in her selfportraits because they reminded her of the vibrant colours of the hot country where she lived. They drew their own self-portraits surrounding it with items, colours and places that reflect their lives.

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Year 4/5 learnt about Mola art. Mola art is a panel sewn onto front and back of dresses worn by the Guna women from Panama. They used different colours, shapes, patterns and layers using collage: cutting out shapes and arranging them to fill the space.
