
## **RPS Weekly Newsletter**

Dear Parents and Carers,

I can't believe it is October already. How quickly time is flying. October heralds the start of Black History Month. Amber, our History and RE lead, led an assembly on Monday to introduce Black History Month. Children will be doing lots of learning during history lessons with a specific focus on **Windrush**. The ship HMT Empire Windrush arrived at the Port of Tilbury on 21 June 1948 and its passengers disembarked a day later. The ship carried Caribbean migrants, many of them veterans of the Second World War. They arrived in England ready to support the countries efforts to rebuild after the end of the war in 1945.



The children will be learning about Baroness Floella Benjamin (a children's author) who made the journey to England. Children will listen to her story 'Coming to England' and will be encouraged to think about what it would have been like to leave your home country. Children in Key Stage 2 will also consider discrimination, what this is and its impact on emotional wellbeing and how to prevent it.



Black History Month Southwark have also announced a month-long programme of

Many of the events are free and a true celebration of our community.


The children really enjoyed getting stuck into some gardening and we are sure that they will appreciate our harvest all the more knowing that they have played such a major role in growing everything.













## **STARS** at work!

At RPS we are passionate about protecting the environment and improving air quality around our school. One of the ways we do this is by promoting sustainable travel. We have been working with TFL and the local authority to create a poster that is now proudly sitting in the noticeboard by the school gates. This shows places within the area that are a 10-minute walk to school and places that are 15 minutes away from school. It also shows bus routes and cycle paths. Please do encourage your children to look at the poster and support them to use the key.

**Fame at last!:** Hal and Zakhar ,two of our STARS team, worked with the local authority on Tuesday to create a film promoting walking to school. The children were very excited about this, and we cannot wait to see the finished product.



Highways consultation: Later in the day two children from the STARs team met with Sam, from the local authority's highways and environment department, to discuss their concerns about people parking close to the school gates. Olatide wrote: 'We discussed the problems we are having with parent's parking outside of school. We discussed about how some people in school have asthma problems and some parents leave their gas on which is hazardous to the health of our pupils'. Alex explained that idling is a real concern as it damages the environment and wondered

if it would be possible to create banners to remind parents not to park or idle directly outside of the school gates. Sam watched the traffic and parking outside of the school and understood their concerns and said he would try to look into some solutions to help the children.

**Books Swap:** One idea the sustainability club had for helping protect the environment was to reuse previously loved books. On Thursday they organized their 2<sup>nd</sup> Book swap event. Children in year 1 to 6 brought in old books to swap for new books. The children had a great time organizing the event and now they have greater access to books to read at home. That's a win win for everyone!
