
# **RPS Weekly Newsletter**

Dear Parents and Carers,

**Refugee Day**: In assembly children considered the meaning of 'asylum seeker' and 'refugee'. A **refugee** is a person who has been forced to leave their country to find safety. An **asylum seeker** is a person who has been forced to leave their country to find safety and has formally applied to another country for protection, but whose application has not yet been decided. The children considered the different reasons a person may seek refuge in another country, due to war, persecution or possibly a natural disaster. They considered what it might be like to have to leave your home and travel long difficult journeys with little comfort or food, to find safety in another part of the world. They learned about human rights and to treat others with kindness and respect.


#### Our Human Rights

The United Nations has written a list of rights which everyone should have; these are our human rights. Here are a few of them. Talk to the person next to you about what you think these mean:



Everyone has the right to feel safe. the right to food, medicine, shelter and warmth. Everyone has the right to an education.

Air pollution: In school we have talked a lot about protecting the environment recently. Year 6 are very passionate about the environment and this week they explored air pollution by investigating what contributes to the quality of our air and the impact that this has on our health. They set up Vaseline covered cards in four different locations around the school to assess how much pollution is in the air around our school. Next week they will look at what is on the card. What will their experiment show? Watch this space!





Scarlet Fever: We have had two confirmed cases of Scarlet Fever this week. One in year 4 & 5 and one in Reception. This typically starts with a fever and flu-like symptoms with a distinctive red rash developing. Please notify the school if your child has a confirmed diagnosis of Scarlet Fever. It is essential that children have their own water bottles to help reduce the risk of infection.

## **Independent Travel Training**




The children learnt that if a drunk person tries to interact with you, avoid them. Then you can report it to somebody like the bus driver.


