






Year 6 attend Junior Citizenship workshop



Michael Rosen's A to Z is an anthology of children's poetry, featuring a diverse range of British performance poets and covering various cultures, voices, and sounds. The collection aims to make poetry exciting, entertaining, and thought-provoking for readers of all ages by showcasing the music, exuberance, and thoughtfulness of poems that range from funny to haunting. The poems are presented as short, accessible "stories" that can be enjoyed by dipping in and out of. On the days, that children have PE, they can dress in the **correct PE kit** for the day (white t-shirt and black tracksuit bottoms) with their school jumper or cardigan.


