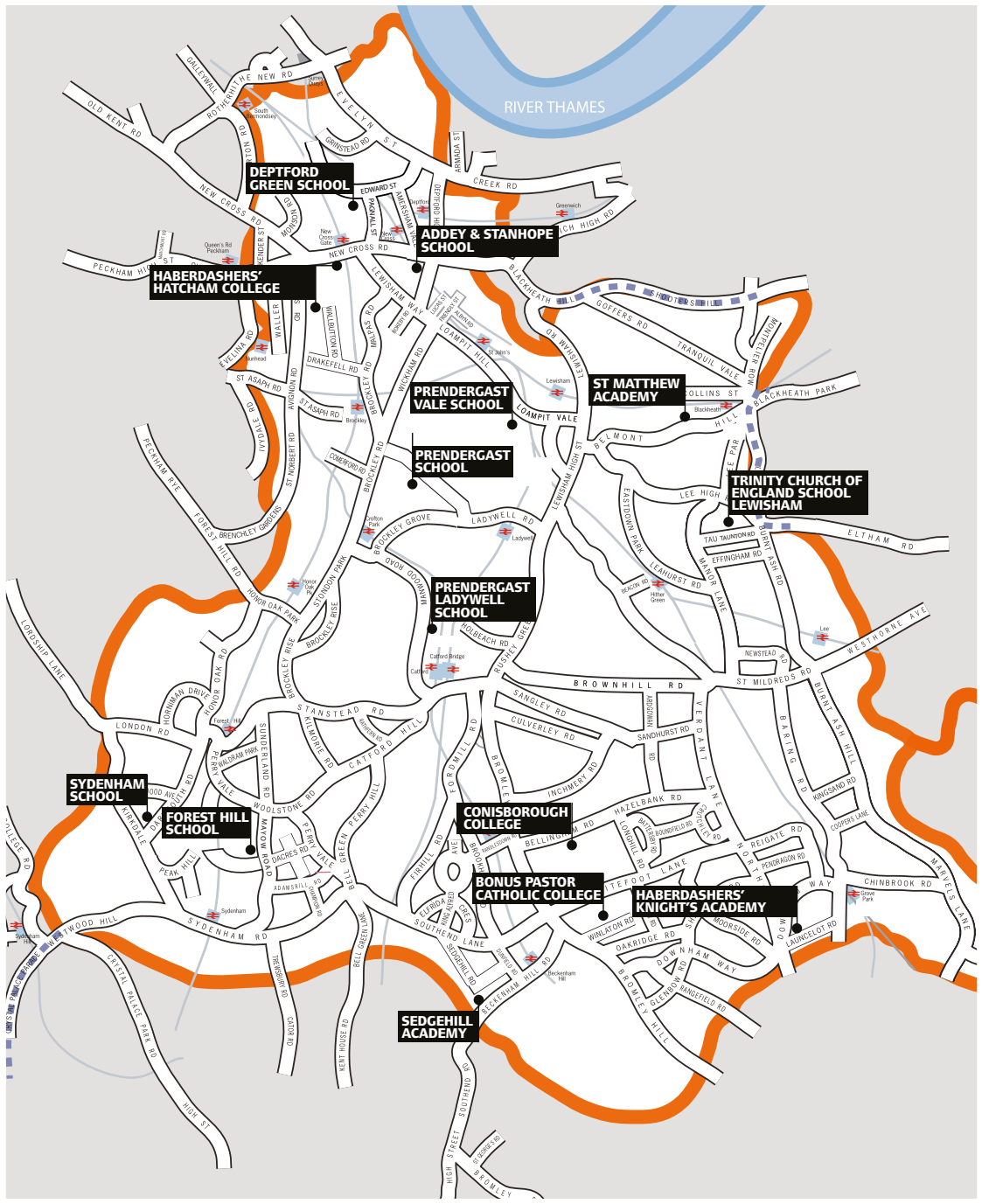

Introduction

Hi there, I'm Cllr Rotimi Skyers, your new Cabinet Member for Children, SEND, Youth Empowerment and Culture.

Lewisham is in my blood and I see you all as family so please know, this is a subject close to my heart. Every child and young person in the borough deserves the chance to learn, grow and thrive.

I know Lewisham's secondary schools are ambitious for every child. The improvements we've seen in recent years reflect the dedication of our teachers and support staff, doing their best to support that leap from primary to secondary.

But education is about more than grades. It's about helping young people become confident, resilient and ready for the future. Our schools offer strong pastoral care and opportunities beyond the classroom to help students discover their interests and build skills.

We are also committed to making sure every child feels included and supported, especially children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND). We know families haven't always found it easy to get the right support. Demand is rising and needs are more complex, with too many families facing long waits or having to travel far from home. We are listening and taking action.

We've recently opened a new specialist SEND unit at Deptford Park Primary School, with up to 40 places for children who need more intensive support. This means more children can learn closer to home, alongside a mainstream school, with the right support in place. And this is just the start, we want to expand this approach into our secondary schools too.

We are also increasing support in mainstream schools and improving how education, health and care services work together. Our plan is to create a more joined-up system where children get help earlier, families have more local choice, and support is easier to access.

New 'Experts at Hand' teams will bring specialists directly into schools, helping children sooner and reducing the need for formal assessments.

We know there is more to do and we won't pretend otherwise. But by working with families, schools and partners, we are building a system that better supports every child.

This prospectus highlights the excellent range of secondary schools in Lewisham. I hope it helps you feel informed and confident as you take the next step in your child's education.

Applying for your child

Applying for a secondary school place can seem like a daunting task. Here are the things you need to know and some tips on the process to help you.

Make a note of the deadline date for applications – Saturday 31 October 2026

You need to apply for secondary schools when your child is in Year 6. The application period starts on 1 September and closes on 31 October each year.

Which schools can I apply for?

You can apply for schools in the borough of Lewisham or outside the borough, but not special schools, alternative provision, pupil referral units, or independent (fee-paying) schools.

Visit as many schools as you can

Visit as many schools as you can before deciding which ones to apply to. School open days will show you more than a league table can – you'll get a flavour of the school, meet headteachers, staff and students, go on a tour of the school and see examples of students' work.

Read the admissions criteria

It's very important that you understand the admissions criteria for the schools you're interested in so you know whether you have a realistic chance of your application being successful.

Use all your six preferences

You can apply to up to six schools. When you apply, you should use all six preferences for the best chance of getting a place at a school of your choosing. You must list your schools in preference order.

Apply online

Applying online is quick and easy. You need to complete a supplementary information form for some schools, as well as naming the school on your application. For example, a church school will need to see evidence from your church leader of church attendance.

National offer day is Monday 1 March 2027

If you made an 'on time' online application, you will get an email on the evening of Monday 1 March 2027, telling you where your child has been offered a place. If you applied on a paper application form, or if you haven't been offered a place at any of the schools you applied for, we will send you the results by first class post or by email on the evening of Monday 1 March 2027.

Special educational needs and disabilities provision and special schools

In Lewisham, we are determined to support all children to thrive and achieve their full potential.

Most children and young people with special educational needs (SEN) and special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) are educated and supported in mainstream schools. Each of our mainstream secondary schools has a special educational needs policy and SEN Information Report published on their website for parents or carers to review and to find out more about the SEN provision of the individual school. These policies and information reports, which apply to all schools, including academies and federation schools as well as community schools, explain the school's approach to SEN and SEND. Reading them is a good place to start when you're planning your school visits and when you are considering options for your young person's transfer to a secondary school.

It's a good idea to talk to other parents of children with SEN, or SEND, or with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) who already attend the school. Most schools will also be happy to arrange a meeting with the Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator (SENCO) before you apply for a place so you can discuss your child's needs and how the school would meet those needs.

If your child has an EHCP, the process of applying for a secondary school is different. The statutory SEN Service will ask you to express your preferences and a formal process of consultations will commence with your preferences. However the admissions authority might also add local preferences to the mix. Your child's primary school and senior SEN case officer can advise further on this via your child's annual review process.

Our four local special schools for children of secondary school age are: Greenvale, New Woodlands, Drumbeat, Brent Knoll. We also have an Alternative Provision called Abbey Manor College.

Some of our secondary schools have SEN Resource Bases within the mainstream setting. These Resource Bases have set admissions criteria, catering for certain special educational needs. The consultations for these places for learners with EHCPs will be undertaken by the statutory SEN Service as advised above.

For 2026 admissions, all distances were measured in metres using a straight line to a point in the school premises as determined by the Ordnance Survey.

How the preference system works

On national offer day your child will be offered one school place. If they qualify for a place at more than one school on the list, they will be offered a place at the school that comes highest out of those potential offers on their list of preferences.

If we can't offer your child a place at one of the schools you applied for, we will offer them a place at the school closest to your home, where there is a vacancy. We strongly recommend you apply for six schools, including your nearest school.

Examples of the preference system

- Child A has applied for six schools. They don't qualify for a place at the first or second preference school but do qualify for a place at their third preference school. We offer the third preference school to the child on national offer day. The fourth, fifth and sixth preference schools are 'settled' (meaning your application is not progressed further) as they were ranked lower on the list. The child stays on the waiting list of their first and second preference schools and they will get the right of appeal for them.
- Child B has applied for one school. The school is oversubscribed and the child does not qualify for one of the vacancies under the admissions criteria. We tell the parent the outcome and about their right to appeal. We offer a place at the closest school in Lewisham to the family's home where there is a vacancy as an alternative. The child stays on the waiting list for their preferred school.
- Child C has applied for six schools and can be offered a place at their first preference school on national offer day. All of the other schools named on the list are 'settled'. However, the child has an older brother at their third preference school and, after national offer day, the parent wants the child to go to that school instead. The parent will then need to contact the admissions team to make a further application so their child's name is added to the school's waiting list. The parent is also advised to accept the school place offered.
- Child D has applied for six schools, all outside the borough, but does not qualify for a place at any of them. We offer a place at a school where there is a vacancy and tell the parent about their right to appeal. However, the parent wants their child to go to a school close to their home, which they hadn't applied for. That school is oversubscribed and has not been able to offer all applicants a place. The parent will need to contact the admissions team to make a further application to add their child's name to the waiting list. The parent is advised to accept the place offered and will remain on the waiting list for their higher preference schools.

Common myths about the admissions process

You will probably hear lots of different things about how the school admissions process works. Here we explain some of the common myths and assumptions people make.

1. My child has a right to a place at one of my preferred schools

Not true. Your child will only be offered a place if they qualify according to the school's admission criteria. If your child does not qualify for any of your preferred schools (for example, because your preferences were unrealistic) they will be offered a place at the nearest school to your home that has a vacancy after all on-time applicants have been offered places.

2. If I list only one school then my child has to be offered a place there

Not true. Listing only one school does not increase your child's chances of being offered a place. You are strongly advised to use all six preferences and include your nearest school among them.

3. I live nearer to the school than a child who was offered a place under the distance criterion last year so my child is guaranteed a place

Not true. The number of pupils that each school offers places to under each criterion can change from year to year. Just because you know pupils living near you that go to a certain school, it doesn't mean your child will be offered a place there. The information about offers in March 2026 for each school is on page 6. However, remember this information is a guide only and no child is guaranteed a place at any school.

4. If I don't put down the nearest school to my house, my child will get allocated a place there anyway

Not true. If your child doesn't get offered a place at any of your preferred schools, they will be offered a place at the nearest school in Lewisham that has places. This won't necessarily be the school nearest to you.

5. If I put the nearest school down on my list of preferences, the local authority will just allocate my child to that school to fill places, regardless of what order I list it

Not true. The admission system is subject to strict legal rules to ensure fairness and is monitored and managed extremely carefully. The local authority will only offer your child a place at the school closest to you if it is on your list and they do not get allocated a place at any schools higher up your list.

6. If I 'hassle' the local authority every day and call or email them constantly to make sure my child gets a place at their preferred school, they will eventually give my child a place to keep me quiet

Not true. You will get a place dependent on where you are in the waiting list. Waiting lists can move between March and September, and you may get other offers. Because of the strict legal rules that guide this process, your chance of getting other offers will not be affected in any way by the amount of contact you have with the admissions team. It's a very busy time for them and they are legally required to allocate places through the admissions criteria process.

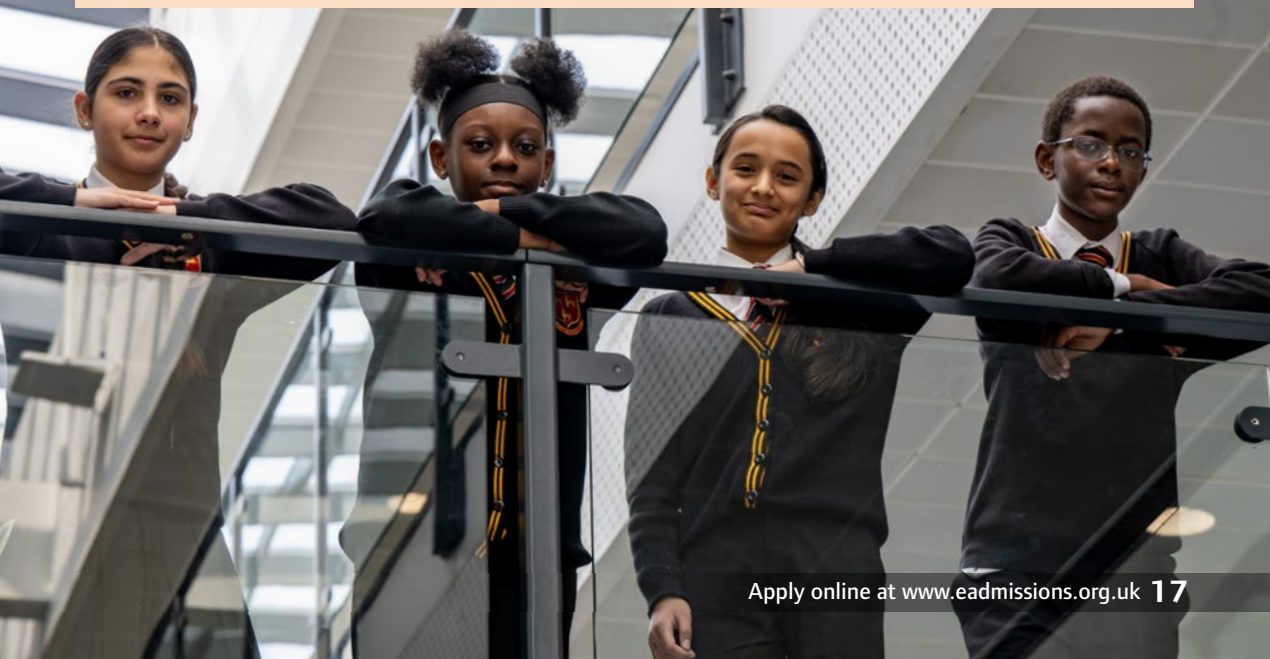
